The fifth annual "In the Pink" Fashion Show and Silent Auction, held Oct. 2 by the Breast Cancer Resource Center of the YWCA Princeton, had a standing room-only crowd of more than 300 at the Westin Princeton at Forrestal Village.

Fashion show models were breast cancer survivors and their family members, physicians, nurses and supporters. More than \$35,000 was raised to benefit the Resource Center, which dedicates itself to providing information and emotional support to those affected by breast cancer and to increasing awareness of the disease in the community.
